FIELD DAY JUNE 27th and 28th, 1981

The last hurrah of Amateur Radio Week will be Field Day at Rattlesnake Point Conservation Area (see maps) Let's make it a hip hip hooray. There is still time to put together a station.

Just a word of explanation. The idea is to contact as many other stations during the twenty-four hour period as possible under simulated emergency conditions. This means portable generators. (See QST May 1981) We log the QSO's, add them up and send them in to A.R.R.L. for judging to see how we stack up against other groups from all over North America.

Last year we had to drop some QSO's because the printing could not be deciphered. Please get the info right and log it legibly. Try to keep your logs clear of duplicate contacts.

The club will again operate a hospitality tent (no charge) serving hot coffee and HOT: Chili. Ruth Granby will preside in the kitchen again.

As well as making sure their radio equipment is in good shape, the band leaders should prepare for trouble as this is the best way to prevent it. Spare tubes, test equipment and tools should be on hand - also operating aids such as SWR meter, antenna coupler, noise filter, goose-neck lamp with yellow bug-light bulb, liquids for when it gets hot, etc., etc. Don't omit the necessary hardware to get your antenna up and try to have heavy extension cord.

For the individual, it's a matter of looking ahead to ensure a reasonable degree of comfort during the 30 hours or so that you might be out there. A flashlight is a must if you are going to be there over night. You should have suitable clothing, both for hot, sunny, daytime and for cold, rainy, night time. You might need bug spray for the tent and/or insect repellant to rub on arms and legs. Don't forget special pills or medicines if you have to take them regularly.

One note of caution, if you are towing a heavy trailer or if the roads are wet, don't try the steep hill on the map but go east on Derry Rd. North on Hwy 25 and West on Steeles Ave.


The final line-up and pull together will take place at the June General Meeting. See you there.

HERE IS CARF NEWS SERVICE RADIO BULLETIN NUMBER 18, BROUGHT TO YOU BY YOUR NATIONAL AMATEUR RADIO SOCIETY, THE CANADIAN AMATEUR RADIO FEDERATION, INCORPORATED.

- * This week's bulletin has an international flavor with reports from near and far.
 - Near at home, one recent event south of the border, as reported in HR Report, is of concern to international operators, especially Canadians. The U.S. Federal Communications Commission has been formally petitioned by the American Radio League to expand U.S. phone operation down to 14.150 megahertz. It has also petitioned to permit higher class U.S. operators to use Al and Fl emissions in the slot of the ten megahertz band to be made available to Amateurs as a result of WARC '79.
 - Amateur equipment in the U.S. a bill has been introduced in the U.S. Senate by one-time presidential candidate Senator Barry Goldwater which would regulate the purchase of transmitters at the point of sale. The bill also proposed to give the FCC the authority to set standards for the rejection of interference by consumer receiving equipment. Because Canada imports much electronic equipment from both the U.S. and the Far East it could affect us by either by imposing U.S. standards on such imports or in being a dumping ground for sub-standard Oriental imports. To thwart these possibilities Canadian authorities and standards organizations are trying to develop our own standards for electro-magnetic compatability for electronic equipments. Not to be outdone, the U.S. House of Representatives has before it a bill which would permit the FCC to delegate to volunteer Amateurs the authority to enforce regulations and to give examinations.
 - Is this article of interest to you as a DX'er? Write to the DOC in Ottawa and make your views known. Don't say afterwards that you "didn't know".

Recently, your Repeater Committee attended an interesting seminer given by Communication Technology of Oshawa. Here, in brief, are some of the details of one of their new circuit boards that could be applied to a repeater. VE3FAH, Rod and VE3KWG, Don are designing and producing these boards.

- -The system is based on the 6800 family of microprocessors. The specific chip being the 6808 which interfaces via 4 PIA units.
- -The unit comes on 2 double sided, plated through PCB's. One PCB is for the digital logic and the alternate board is the Audio interface board. Both of these boards are using a easy layout density, but a large enough (about 10" X 13") so that a lot of capability is included.
- -The unit is referred to as the Model 3403
- -The digital board contains 16K of 2716 PRDM. 8K is used by the basic system and BK is available for repeater control. The system includes a control monitor program which may be accessed via radio and/or via a 1200 Baud RS-232C terminal.
- -A watchdog timer has been included which can be given various tasks including identifying faulty conditions, faulty codes and a degree of system protection not normally available by alternate means.
- -The audio board takes receiver audio in (up to 4 receivers) and can direct any input to either a) transmitter, b) phone, and c) DTMF decoder (TOUCH TONE* Decoder) in turn the Transmitter audio can be taken from any of the following sources a) DTMF key pad, b) phone, or c) any of several receivers.

The decoder system is by the high reputation company MITEL of Ottawa and the encoder includes redial, auto redial and so 20 other functions.

To improve patch audio for radio use, a compressor is included on the audio from the phone to the transmitter. This helps overcome back ground noise for the mobile operator.

-Separate timing exists to control the length of phone patches. this function can be remotely enabled or disabled, a warning can be enabled which will let the user know if there is less that 30 seconds left for the current phone patch.

The phone patch can have a separate beep to let the person on the phone know when to speak.

- -Up to 64 telephone numbers can be preprogrammed into the unit and users may then use their access code to trigger these calls.
- -Up to 16 identification fields are permitted. This allows multi-link operation. The idents are sent in C.W. and may be 'brag info'. Only the first ident is automatic per repeater regulations, the remaining are requested by users.
- -Commands are flexible and on a 12 digit pad, 144 commands can be set up. On a 16 digit pad, 512 commands can be set up.

Simplex channels on 2 meters:

This breakdown of simplex frequencies came about because of the article by Paul, VE3PQ, in the last issue of the TFM bulletin.

The repeater council has provided us with what seems to be a fairly well worked out band plan for 2 meters, and have allowed considerable space amongst the repeaters for simplex operation. In order to take off some of the congestion from the repeaters it is suggested that we should QSY to a simplex frequency if that operation is feasible.

I was not aware of the simplex frequencies that are available until I sat down and made up this list. It has been quite useful to me, and I hope it will be to you.
