"ADVENTURE IN THE NORTH ATLANTIC"



Between 1955 and 1960 there were four Trans Atlantic Telephone cables laid across the Atlantic between Britain, France, Iceland, Greenland and Canada.

The Canadian base for the laying was in Newfoundland, and it was my pleasure to be in charge of the Radio Service during these Lays.

Our first station was in Clarenville, and the equipment consisted of two 4K.W. S.S.B transmitters, together with the usual receivers. The staff consisted of three operators and myself.

In June 1959, prior to the cable ship "Monarch" leaving Clarenville to lay the cable to Penmarche, France, I had the pleasure of going on board and arranging the Radio Schedules with the Operators.

Proceeding to a position of 39.39 Degrees West, the cable was transfered to the cable ship "Ocean Layer". The "Monarch" then proceeded to London. The "Ocean Layer" continued laying cable towards France. Her position was frequently received, and passed on to Montreal. At the same time the cable engineers on board the ship were in constant communication with the engineers in Clarenville.

About 2 a.m June 15th, one of the operators called me and said he had lost contact with the "Ocean Layer"....We tried calling him on all our frequencies, but to no avail.

We finally received a message from London telling us that the "Ocean Layer" was on fire, and was being abandoned in position 19.14 West. :::...The cable was cut, and thrown overboard and Montreal was immediately advised.

The cable ship "Monarch" was then called, and advised of this catastrophe, and ordered to the position hwere the cable had been cut. This she proceeded to do, and finally after picking up the cable, continued laying it to France.

On the 6th of July we received a message from the "Monarch" saying that she had arrived in Penmarche France, at 0800 GMT. The final splice was made at 1317 hrs GMT, and the bight was overboard Montreal being duly advised... The amount of cable laid had been - 2103 "nautical miles.....

Our station CJM 878 was soon released and closed down, Montreal being advised.

Months later I had the pleasure of meeting the operator of the "Ocean Layer" when he was on another ship in Vancouver. He told me the "Ocean Layer" was an ex German ship, and it was rather a coincidence that it was a German ship that picked up his SOS, and had recued the survivors..... The other three cables were laid with no trouble at all.

1982 BUILDING PROJECT

The executive of the HARC are considering another building project as a "club project." In the past, we have had a synthesizer, frequency counter and computing SWR bridge. Frojects preferably are within the \$50 to \$150 cost range, and should be within the construction ability of most amateurs. Step-by-step plans and circuit explanation will appear each month in the club bulletin.

The following have been suggested, and we ask for an indication

of your preference:

- 1. 6 amp. to 10 amp. DC power supply for 25-watt two meter rigs, to have over-voltage and short protection.
- 2. Cordless remote antenna switch, to switch three antennas on one feedline with no control cables needed. About \$50.

3. RF signal generator. Synthesized.

- 4. Two meter linear amplifier -- for instance, five watts in and 35 watts out. Input power could be discussed; perhaps could be made to handle either one or 10 watts in.
- 5. Antenna tuner, 80 through 10 meters, with relative power meter or SWR bridge.

6. Digital capacitance meter.

- 7. Ni-cad battery charger. Protection and limit circuitry so you can fast charge.
- 8. Two meter preamplifier.
