

### ORDER OF THE GAVEL CW OPERATING AWARD

### A. Purpose

To promote the use of CW and to stimulate an interest among the newer Hams to operate in the HF bands.

### B. Rules

- 1. The event is open to all members of the HARC
- 2. The award may only be won once.
- 3. The contest will be an annual event.
- 4. Only the previous 12 months will be considered, from January 1st through December 31st. In the case of a Ham of less than 12 months, the score will be prorated by dividing 365 by the number of days licenced, times the score of poits attained.
- The following point system will be used to decide the winner:
   200 watts or more input 1 point per QSO.
   Under 200 watts input 2 points per QSO.
   Under 10 watts input 5 points per QSO.
- 6. The total points from above will be adjusted by a DX multiplier of 1, 2, or 5 points per DX country in relation to the power levels listed above. DX will be the current A.R.R.L. DX country list. there will be no Dx multiplier for U.S.A.
- 7. A valid QSO will be QTH, RST and name.
- 8. The point score thus established will be adjusted according to the following:

A Ham licenced for 3 years or more will subtract 25% from his score.

A Ham licenced for under 3 years (but more than 2) will subtract 15% from his score.

A Ham licenced for 2 years will subtract 10% from his score.

A Ham licenced for 1 year or less will use total score he (she) attains.

### Bulletin 34 CRRL 1987 November 15

- 1: DOC has announced the signing of a special reciprocal licensing and third-party traffic agreement between Canada and the Soviet Union. This agreement, the result of many months of work by CRRL officials, became effective on November O1 and will remain in effect until the completion of the joint Canada Soviet Union Polar Bridge Skitrek expedition next year. The agreement will permit Skitrek members to use Amateur Radio as their principal means of communications during their expedition.
- 2: The IARU Region 2 Executive Committee chaired by Pedro Seiderman, YV5BPG, held its 1987 Annual Meeting in Bridgetown, Barbados, on October 17-18. The Committee reviewed the Ninth General Assembly of IARU Region 2 held in Argentina last year, the rapid growth of packet radio in Region 2, band plans, financial matters and the need to begin preparations for a General WARC which could be held as early as 1992. The Committee chose Orlando, Florida and 1989 October as the site and date for the Tenth General Assembly of IARU Region 2. Canadians are well represented in IARU, through CRRL and CRRL President Tom Atkins, VE3CDM, who is IARU Region 2 Treasurer.

#### Bulletin 35 CRRL 1987 November 22

1: A follow-up on a Mexican proposal, made at the recent Mobile WARC held in Geneva, Switzerland, to reallocate the 430-440 MHz band in Mexico to the Mexican Land Mobile Service: Not much will likely happen. First, one of the ground rules for a WARC limited to a single service is that no action can be taken which would significantly affect another service - and in this case, the Amateur, Amateur Satellite and Radiorelocation services would be affected - unless such action is included in the WARC's agenda. Apparently, the Mexican proposal was not. Second: as a result of talks with IARU President Dick Baldwin, W1RU, who was an observer at the WARC, Mexico agreed to limit its proposal to 430-435 and 438-440 MHz. This would protect the Amateur Satellite service. Finally, just before the end of the WARC, Mexico announced a further modification. There would be consultation with other administrations when an assignment in the new Land Mobile band was made. However. since throughout the proceedings, the US, which would be most affected by such assignments, was opposed to the proposal, on the basis that it would have a negative impact on US amateur and radiorelocation assignments in the 430-440 MHz band, it is not expected that, in the forseeable future, many Mexican Land Mobile assignments will be made.

- 2: South of the border, the US FCC has dismissed a number of Petitions for Reconsideration of Docket 86-161, the FCC's "Novice Enhancement" package. FCC declined to give US Novices additional frequencies in the 220 MHz band, to alter the present makeup of Novice examinations or to allow holders of the US Advanced-class license to administer written tests for the US General-class license.
- 3: A reminder to amateurs in British Columbia: New address of the CRRL VE7 Incoming QSL Bureau is Alex Ivsic, VE7CNE, F12-6961 Hall Avenue, Burnaby, BC VSE 3A8. You do not have to be a CRRL member to use this bureau.

### Bulletin 36 CRRL 1987 November 29

Amateurs everywhere will be saddened to learn of the death of Ron Hesler, VE1SH. Ron was first licensed in 1937 as VE1KS, and later, as VE2QF. During his life, he served Amateur Radio as Vice Director and, later, as Director of the Canadian Division of ARRL; as first President of CRRL; as Director of QCWA; and finally, at the time of his death, as CRRL Atlantic Region Director. Throughout his life, Ron felt strongly that Amateur Radio was worth working for. In 1979, Ron incorporated the Canadian Division of ARRL as CRRL. He is why CRRL exists today. Many amateurs will want to extend their sympathies to Ron's wife, Ellen, and to

all of Ron's family. We have lost a true servant of Canadian Amateur Radio, a fellow amateur and friend.

- 2: Andy McLellan, VE1ASJ, has been appointed to complete Ron Hesler's term as CRRL Atlantic Region Director. Andy is a well-known contester and DXer, and Manager of the CRRL Central Incoming and CRRL VE1 Incoming QSL Bureaus. He served as CRRL Atlantic Region Director from 1982 until 1986.
- 3: Complaints of RFI have resulted in an unnamed Alberta amateur being taken off the air, and Manitoba amateur, Robert Kauffman, VE46V, having his power limited to 100 watts output. In both cases, alleged "interference to radiocommunications" was involved. It all shows that DOC will invoke Section 64.4 of the General Radio Regulations, Part 2, and the urgent need for RF susceptibility legislation to protect users of the RF spectrum.
- 4: Bill Loucks, VE3AR, represented CRRL at a recent meeting of Canadian Standards Association (CSA)

Steering Committee on Electromagnetic Compatibility. This committee is charged with planning, programming, coordinating and monitoring CSA's standards writing activities related to maximizing the RF immunity of electric and electronic equipment, and minimizing pollution of the RF environment.

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
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### THE LAST WORD
