During the full week of the event our dispatchers controlled the movement of the vehicles and shift changes of the drivers, who logged over 15,000 kilometers and over 1500 man-hours. The function was to transport people involved with the skating championships between Copps Coliseum and the Mountain Arena and the local hotels. During and since the event, I received many unsolicited comments from the organizers and participants how impressed they were with the transportation system. INTRODUCTION TO PACKET RADIO - Part 9 - by Larry Kenney, WB9LOZ

In this part we're going to look at the White Pages. No. not your local telephone directory, but the packet radio directory known as the "White Pages". You help supply the information for "WP", and you can also use it to find the home BBS, QTH and zip code of your friends on packet. White Pages was initially designed by Eric Williams, WD6CMU, of Richmond, California, Hank Ofedson, WORLL, later added a WP database to his packet builetin board software. It's a database of packet users showing their name, home BBS, QTH and zip code, it's updated and queried by packet message, allowing stations from all over the world to take advantage of it. As users enter their name, home BBS, QTH and zip code into the BBS user file, the software automatically assembles a message once a day containing all of the latest user information and sends it to AD81 in Ohio, now the national White Pages Server. Systems in Northern California also exchange this information. As a result, you can easily find the name, home BBS, QTH and zip code of other packet stations on packet all across the country using the White Pages database.

If your BBS is operating with its own WP database, you may make inquiries of it using the "I" command. Simply enter I followed by the callsign you'd like information about. If you wanted information on WB9LOZ, for example, you would enter: I WB9LOZ

Information from the WD6CMU or AD8I White Pages is information from the WD6CMU or AD8I White Pages is obtained by sending a message to "WP @ WD6CMU.CA" or "WP @ AD8I.OH". Since the messages are read and answered by the WP software, not a person, you must use the correct format: <callsign> Q CHI? You may include as many requests as you wish in one message, but each request must be on a separate line. The last line of the message should be: DE spearate line. The last line of the message should be: DE returned to you at your home BBS. If the return address line is not given, the WP program will attempt to determine the originating station and BBS from the message headers. If the requested information is not available from the WP database. Here's an example of a message sent to the WD6CMU or AD8I White Pages database: (Your BBS prompt) W6BBS> SP WD6CMU.CA (SP WP @ AD8I.OH would be Enter subject of message: Query used for the AD8I database.) ITEM O1 RABC WONT HELP BYLAW ISSUESThe Radio Advisory Board of Canada ha declined to assist CRRL and CARF in getting DOC to deal with municipalities on restrictive antenna tower bylaws. The President of the RABC Executive Committee wrote CARF and CRRL stating, "While the issue of antenna placement is a problem for all radio users, and the RABC can deal with the board to address specific concerns of individual user the Board to address specific concerns of individual user

In a response to the RABC Executive Committee, CARF Find a response to the RABC Executive Committee, CARF President Farrell Hopwood stated, ..., bylaws which outright prohibit or unduly restrict the use of effective antenna impact broadly on all radio communications users not just amateur

radio operators.

The issue in question has little to do with DOC "site" licensing policies for various clients, but rather the right of all lawful station licensees to be able to use radio communications "effectively" and the expectations of the broader community with respect to environmental matters. This then, is an issue of the interpretation of the federal, provincial and municipal law and the rights and obligations of all concerned with respect to the use of antennas, it is not a "single user" issuel it impacts on the rights and obligations of all licers".

The apparent unwillingness of government, and unhappily now RABC, to help us in the resolution of this pivotal question is disturbing. It tends to undermine our faith in our government and in our institutions. Many of Canada's 35,000 amateur radio operators will be disappointed by this turn of events.

It is also clear that the municipalities are not aware of the DOC'S mandate with respect to bylaws and need to be better informed about the "Townsend" report which spells out what a municipality may or may not regulate.

About 300 Vancouver Amateurs challenged DOC Ottawa About 300 Vancouver Amateurs challenged DOC Ottawa About 300 Vancouver Amateurs challenged DOC Ottawa structures and municipal by-laws at a North Vancouver meeting in early February. The hall was jam packed with Hams, many of whom angrily charged the DOC with refusing to take on municipalities who violate federal law and prohibit or restrict antenna towers. The representatives falled to satisfy the demands of the local Hams that DOC must uphold Federal jurisdiction over antenna structures.

DOC's refusal to commit the department to take on the municipalities caused cries from the Hams who wanted the current policy circular on consulting with municipalities scrapped or at least rewritten to emphasize the Federal primacy in radio matters. One Ham demanded that DOC meet its legal obligations by upholding the mandate Parliament had given it to control radio matters.

Many were also incensed by DOC's apparent unwillingness to champion EMC standards for home electronic equipment which is susceptible to nearby R.F. transmissions. DOC is not ready to impose standards, preferring industry and manufacturers to operate under voluntary agreements. This produced a lot of heckling and pointed jibes at DOC policy as next to useless.

All in all it was an interesting meeting, Amateurs were able to vent their frustrations and express their dissatisfaction. However, at least on the surface. DOC appeared to go away unrepentant and uncommitted and seemed unwilling to change their way or policies, but its not likely that DOC left the nolsy meeting indifferent. J.F.
