### AMATEUR DELEGATION WORKING GROUP FORMED

Officials of Industry Canada (IC) and Radio Amateurs of Canada (RAC) met in Ottawa December 2, 1993 to start work toward delegating to RAC the administration of the Amateur Radio Service. A special Ottawa "Amateur Delegation Working Group" (ADWG) was formed. The group will prepare an agreement on delegation, undertake a feasibility study and present a business case for the overall proposal. A final approval of the proposal is not expected to take place before 1995.

Mike Connolly, Director of Spectrum Management Operations and RAC President Farrell Hopwood VE7RD led their respective delegations during the talks. The RAC team on the working group includes Jim Dean, VE3IQ (Team Leader), Ken Pulfer, VE3PU and John Gilbert, VE3CXL. Industry Canada's participants from Spectrum Management Operations include Darius Breau, Tom Jones and Hugh Clark.

The four main areas which RAC could eventually manage are: certification; documentation; licensing; and spectrum control. Depending on the formulation of the agreement, specific areas of delegation could include: maintaining examination questions; issuing call signs; getting delegated examiners; exclusively publishing all documents relating to amateurs; and spectrum surveillance.

### OUTGOING QSL BUREAU

The outgoing RAC QSL Bureau is moving to Alberta. The new address is Bag 5000, Morinville, AB., TOG 1PO. The custodian is Norm Waltho VE6VW. The VE6 incoming QSL Bureau has been switched to Larry Langston VE6LLL, P.O. Box 3364, Ft. Saskatchewan, AB. T8L 2T3.

For outgoing cards, put your return address on the front upper corner of your envelope containing your cards. Put your RAC membership number under your address. Don't put more than six or seven cards in each envelope and arrange them in order of prefix and also extensions.

To receive incoming cards, simply supply the RAC Bureau with a number of self-addressed envelopes and enough money to cover postage. If postage rates change, send enough money to cover increase. Finally, please be patient. The Bureau is staffed by dedicated volunteer hams who do all the assembling, sorting and mailing.

### TECHNICAL NETS

The Scarborough Amateur Radio Club bulletin mentions three Sunday nets which may be of interest. On 14.317MHz starting at 1700z there is an Icom Users Net with AB40H (Canadian sign VE3DGY), providing detailed technical support, followed at 1900z by a Yeasu net and then at 20.00z by a Kenwood net.

Railway Fanciers there are nets. Sunday 1800z 14.170 MHz, Wednesday 0200z on the Ontars frequency 3.755MHz. Net control is Wesley VE3FQM in London. The group is known as CARRA i.e. Canadian Amateur Radio Railroaders Association.

The ITU has assigned new prefixes - Canada has issued some new ones also.

# REPEATER IN THE SKY CALLED A SUCCESS

A balloon carrying an 800 milliwatt, 2-metre repeater was launched on October 30, 1993 and travelled from Hawkesbury, Ontario to New Brunswick. VE2AW, Gerry, confirmed 374 QSO's. Other stations running nets included one in Quebec City, and Rimouski, Quebec, and then finally Carleton, New Brunswick. From Carleton, VE1 operators could listen to the balloon. In advance announcements, operators expected the balloon to reach heights of 20,000 to 50,000 feet.

# Order of the Gavel CW Operating Award Competition

Purpose: To promote the art of CW operating within the club. HARC members are to contact as many other amateurs as possible. All CW contacts with fixed or mobile licensed amateur radio stations around the world count.

### Rules:

- 1. The competition runs annually from January 1 to December 31 and is open to all HARC members except previous trophy winners.
- Valid contacts include all CW QSO's in which RST, name aand QTH are exchanged. Contest type QSO.s are not valid unless they contain this information.
- 3. Contacts may take place on any band that you are authorized to use.
- 4. Points:
  - a) contacts made using less than 10 watts input power, W/VE QSO's count 5 points each; DX QSO,s count 25 points each.
  - b) contacts made using less than 200 watts input power' W/VE QSO,s count 2 points each; DX QSO,s count 4 points each.
  - c) contacts made using 200 watts or more input power, all QSO,s count 1 point each.
    Total points equals the sum of above.
- 5. Experience equalizer: In order to give newly licensed Hams an advantage over the high speed experienced Hams, the following adjustment is applied to the above final point tally:
  A Ham licensed for three years or more will subtract 25% from his score.
  A Ham licensed for under three years but more than two will subtract 15% from his score.
  A Ham licensed for two years will subtract 10% from his score.
  A ham licensed for 1 year or less will use total score above.
- 6. Deadline: A summary sheet must be mailed in to HARC not later than 30 days after the contest ends.
- 7. The trophy will be awarded to the highest scoring station at the February meeting.
