From the Editor's Desk

Devolution of Services

Recessionary times creates strange and wondrous effects particularly within the federal government. No doubt you have noticed the development and use by politicians of such key words as "downsizing", "re-engineering", "economic restraint", "decentralization", "contracting out", etc.

Amateur radio operators will soon realize the impact of all this bureaucrateze as a result of negotiations between RAC and Industry Canada. Industry Canada is apparently anxious to devoid itself of all "public services" associated with amateur radio such as the selection and appointment of designated examiners, conducting qualifying examinations for candidates for amateur radiolicenses, call sign assignment, licensing of amateur radio operators, and the overall policing of the hobby. In effect, the government wants to maintain its legislative and policy formulation responsibility and hand over responsibility for almost everything else pertaining to amateur radio to the amateur radio community.

It is understood that the target date for the transfer of the foregoing responsibilities is mid 1995.

Do You Know?

Do you know that Industry Canada will release to the public all information that appears on radio licences to facilitate frequency coordination between users? The only exceptions to be made are where the information relates to national security, to federal, provincial or municipal police operations or to that which pertains to foreign governments and embassies.

This is of particular benefit to amateurs using bands shared with other services who want to coordinate amateur frequencies with those of other services in the band. A fee may be charged for the release of this information by Industry Canada.

Unveiling of New Antenna Tower Policy Due Soon

The long awaited Industry Canada new policy concerning the erection of antenna towers is scheduled for release sometime this fall. However, usually reliable sources have indicated that the new policy is designed to quell constituents' complaints to their MPs. and not necessarily to satisfy amateur radio operators. Apparently the new policy will spell out the requirement that prior to erecting an antenna tower amateurs will have to first "consult" with municipal authorities to ensure the tower does not destroy the aesthetics of the neighbourhood (interpreted this means a control on the height of the tower, its location on your property and even the colour of paint you use to paint it). The new policy, it is hoped, will put an end to the rash of complaints the department is forced to deal with from neighbourhood residents about "unsightly" antenna towers and, more particularly the effects of EMI. In addition, the new policy should end the arguements which have been going on for a number of years with municipalities across Canada who have challenged the federal government over who has legislative authority over the erection of antenna towers.

If the foregoing is true, and we have every reason to believe it is, the new policy will certainly satisfy the politicians as it will calm troubled waters - but it will certainly cause amateur radio operators to be irate. But then again who are amateur radio operators - they are only the group who pay for the right to operate radio stations and the group to whom the authorities and the public alike depend upon for communications in disasters and emergencies



UHF Frequency Testing Simplex

The Annual Nature Walkathon in Hamilton has always had faulty communications. Equipment failure and operator errors occurred each time. As part of the volunteer group I suggest Amateur Radio can assist in communications. A system of check points, established by organization for East Mountain and King Forest Areas were identified. I knew that Amateurs were prepared for assisting in communications.

I ask for some volunteers at our general meeting in May. A few members responded, VE3VMO Vic, VA3ART Arie, VE3ZYD Jason and myself VE3DWJ David. The test proved to be interesting and results gratifying. The exercise was to cover the area mention to find out if all stations can communicate with each other and what power is needed.

The test area was from Albion Falls to Hixon Road, Mohawk Road Ski Lift and the Rail Trail lookout point overlooking the Kenilworth traffic circle. By the way VE3ZYD had to use his bike to get to the lookout. He is in good physical shape as no heavy puffing was heard during his transmissions. At all points mention above, the group using handhelds can indeed speak to each other via simplex. The Club's UHF Repeater would be the secondary backup if problems occured.

I reported back to the organization that radio contact can be done by Amateurs for all their check points. They were going to use

cellular phones. (Past events show they need help).

Fleamarkets were on during Saturday, June 3. A few phone calls to busy people always works. On Friday night before the event, changes were made. Two routes were cancelled because of rain. Only the rail trail with two check points was approved. Uncle Murphy came into the picture. The check points were changed. I still felt that we can help. The amateurs who were on the two cancelled routes I let them go.

On Saturday morning, the work crew of volunteers set the stage for the walkathon. All signs, tents, water where in place, the Mayor said a few words and the walk began. Still they insisted that the phones will work. A couple of amateurs showed up. I suggest they go about their alternate plans for the day, but listen to repeater just in case.

Well I shall assume by now you know want went wrong. The command post cellular phone battery went dead. Not enough phones to spare. I called my four volunteers to return. We decide earlier to use a repeater for the check points. VA3NZ Lorraine, our President, I placed at the Start/Finish position. My position at the halfway point Wenthworth St railway crossing completed the link.

A third Amateur who has a bike stood by waiting for failure at the 1/4 mark. But the cellular phones were working between the 1/4 to 1/2 check points. VA3AM Al was not used. The walkathon was a sucess.

Here is an example where amatures can assist groups who believe that modern technology will work indefinitely without failure. When was the last time you tried to run equipment on batteries for 6 hours? If you are a net controller, can you provide such a service? Are you equipped to do emergency communications? Check out your batteries.
