The next meeting, Wednesday, May 17th, is our annual HOME BREW NIGHT featuring a Home Brew contest, judging and awarding of the Crawford Radio trophy. In addition there will be a SHOW AND TELL session where amateurs are invited to show and tell about a piece of Amateur Radio Equipment, or pass along a good idea that could benefit other amateurs. Come and share your good ideas and see what has been brewing over the past year. Here is some background information.

WHAT IS THE CRAWFORD TROPHY?

George Crawford, VE3YR, founder of Crawford Radio in Hamilton at 119 -121 John Street North, and his son, Bill, VE3JU, brought radio to the city of Hamilton. Here is a thumbnail sketch taken from the January 1950 HARC newsletter.

"BILL CRAWFORD, VE3|U, puts in the time down at the Crawford Radio, at the corner of King William and Hughson in Hamilton. First interested in ham radio in 1927, started in to learn CW with Wib Clemence, Elton French and Slim Crossley. Licensed in 1931, and as most do, ambled down the line thru 80, then to 40 meters. Became educated to phone in 1933 but does take the odd jaunt down to ten. Must get his parts wholesale as he has one of the best and nicest looking rigs around the country. Married, but does get out with the boys occasionally. 74 Years of Amateur Radio 1932-2006

Lives down on the Beach Boulevard amid the high tension lines.

In the late 1920s it was big news that a new radio station KDKA Pittsburgh was coming on the air. George was asked to put on a demonstration of the event at the local church and capture the grand moment of the station debut. Tickets were sold out. George worked all afternoon testing his home-built radio, at least as best he could with no other stations to listen to. In his

Parking on location. Complimentary refreshments. exuberance, he put the B+ supply to the filaments of the tubes, and blew them all. He rushed back to his store for the parts, then rushed back to the church. After some frantic last minute repairs, the receiver was up and running. The event was a success with the Standing Room Only crowd cheering wildly at the magic of radio."

The Crawford Trophy was given to the club by Crawford Radio. I remember that store where you would always see a few of the local hams hanging around to talk radio and purchase parts. I was not a ham at the time but visited the store on occasion looking for small pliers and a wire cutter suitable for electronics work. They could show you good ones, with names like Klein.and Lindstrom.

Naturally, the purpose of presenting the Crawford Trophy is to encourage members to build their own equipment. The trophy was first awarded in 1963 has been presented in May, each year, ever since. The home brew project must be usable in amateur radio operating, and must be completed by the builder during the previous 12 months.

If you have something that could qualify, no matter how large or small, bring it along. Your contribution may inspire others to do a little building, or just to appreciate another dimension of the hobby.

At the same time as the Home Brew Night we also hold a Show and Tell session to learn about other pieces of equipment that DO NOT QUALIFY for the Home Brew Contest. If you have something that is usable in amateur radio operating and you feel our members could benefit from seeing it, this is your opportunity to show and tell. While the Judges for the home brew competition are deliberating we have a spot of time to see some show and tell items. So, please, bring along an item or idea to share with the group.

Our next contest is Field Day on June 24th and 25th, operating time is 2:00 PM local time until 2:00 PM the following day at the Rock Chapel site. The contest group will be there. <u>Repeater Report</u>. John Vandenberg, VE3DVV, reported that the VE3NCF -UHF repeater developed a problem and was taken off the air for servicing. As a result there is no link between 70 cm and 2 meters and no telephonepatch. At this time the 2 meter repeater is operating as a stand-alone machine. The UHF machine will be returned to service

Lighthouse On The Air. Rick Danby, VE3BK, reported that the Lighthouse On The Air event occurs on August 19th and 20th. Plans are underway to get a group together to operate from a lighthouse on those days. The idea is to raise public awareness of Amateur Radio in the community and to have a social event for members. We are getting information together to submit to government for approval to participate. We plan to put up an informtion table about Amateur Radio, and to operate a station in the Lighthouse event for the public to view. The old Hamilton Lighthouse on the beach strip is #63. The site we have our eye on is in Hamilton City jurisdiction and we might not even need Federal Government approval if the City gives its approval. The site is right beside the foot path along the beach so there would be lots of people going back and forth at that location. Mark Proctor, VE3RYI, is working on the arrangements. There is a group of volunteers that maintain and publicize the lighthouse, so if we got in touch with them we might be able to get them to come down and be part of the publicity effort. We are looking for a group of interested people to help with the planning and field work to get this idea off the ground. Rick Danby will coordinate this effort but help is needed now. Let Rick know if you can help out with the planning and organization.

Rules for the 2006 RAC Canada Day Contest

This outline was transcribed from the RAC web site. For more details see the RAC web site.

Each year on July I, the anniversary of Canada's Confederation, Radio Amateurs of Canada (RAC) sponsors the Canada Day Contest. Amateurs all over the world are invited to Canada's Birthday Party on the air.

Contest Period: 0000 UTC to 2359 UTC July 1, 2005.

Bands and Modes: 160, 80, 40, 20, 15, 10, 6 and 2 metres, CW and phone (SSB, FM, AM, etc.)

Suggested frequencies: CW - 25 kHz up from the band edge and for SSB -1850, 3775, 7075, 7225, 14175, 21250, 28500 kHz. Check for CW activity on the half-hour.

Exchange: Stations in Canada send RS (T) and province or territory.VEØs and stations outside Canada send RS (T) and a serial number.

QSOs: Contacts with stations in Canada or VEØs are worth 10 points. Contacts with stations outside Canada are worth 2 points. Contacts with RAC official stations are worth 20 points. RAC official stations are: VA2RAC,VA3RAC,VEIRAC, VE4RAC,VE5RAC,VE0RAC, VE7RAC,VE8RAC,VE9RAC, VOIRAC,VO2RAC,VY0RAC, VY1RAC and VY2RAC. You may work any station once on each of the two modes, on each of the eight contest bands.

It is prohibited to make CW contacts in the conventional phone sub-bands, phone contacts in the conventional CW sub-bands, or to make or solicit QSOs through a repeater during the contest period.

Important points

Executive Meetings

HARC Executive committee meets each month, except July and August, at Mohawk College in room E031B. All members are invited to attend and participate. The meetings are on the Tuesday following the club General Meeting each month.

HARC operates VE3NCF repeater, located atop the Niagara Escarpment. It's open for use by all Amateurs. Special features are a privilege of membership.

<u>Nets</u>

HARC "check-in net" is held every Tuesday evening, except July and August, at 7:30pm. HARC "swap net" follows at 8pm. The ARES net is held on Thursdays at 8:00pm. All contacts are welcome.

Examinations

Amateur radio licence examinations are conducted the second Wednesday each month, except July and August. Contact the voluntary examiners to make an appointment. Each test \$5.

Membership Information

Club membership, including all privileges, is \$25 per person, per year, Sept 1 to Aug 31. Additional membership, for immediate family living in the same home, is \$1 per person. One newsletter sent to each address.

The Hamilton Amateur

The Hamilton Amateur is published ten times each year (not in July or August). Deadline for article submission is the *last Saturday* of the month for the next month's issue. Preferred format is .txt file. Articles will be checked for spelling and grammar, but the author is responsible for the factual content. E-mail submissions to Mardy, VE3QEE < ve3qee@rac.ca >

Multipliers: Thirteen in total, Canada's 10 provinces and three territories. Each multiplier may be counted once on each mode on each of the eight contest bands. The multipliers, with their postal abbreviations and prefixes are: Nova Scotia [NS] (VE1, VA1, CY9, CYØ); Quebec [QC] (VE2,VA2); Ontario [ON] (VE3,VA3); Manitoba [MB] (VE4,VA4); Saskatchewan [SK] (VE5,VA5); Alberta [AB] (VE6,VA6); British Columbia [BC] (VE7,VA7); Northwest Territories [NT] (VE8); New Brunswick [NB] (VE9); Newfoundland and Labrador [NL] (VO1,VO2); Nunavut [NU] (VY0); Yukon [YT] (VY1); and Prince Edward Island [PE] (VY2).

Final Score: The total QSO points from all bands multiplied by the total number of multipliers from all bands.

There is more information on the web site itself, and also the link to a program for generating a cabrillo file to submit results after the contest is over if you have been logging contacts by hand.

Of course, Rick is looking for operators to come out and join the contest group at the site, but if you are unable join the group, at least you can give a few contacts from home. After all, this is our Canadian contest in celebration of our country's birthday. You should participate, even if it is only for a few minutes, enough to make five or ten contacts from home. We'll be listening for you. - ed.

Elections and HARC Annual Meeting

Notice is hereby given that on Wednesday June 20th the Hamilton Amateur Radio Club will hold its Annual General Meeting. At this meeting we will hear reports and hold the Election of Club Directors for the following year, September 2006 to April 31, 2007.

The way the process works, six directors are elected each year, and the current President becomes a 7th director automatically. In this way the Club preserves continuity. The elected directors then meet and decide among themselves based on their skills and experience who will fill each of the official positions in the coming year.

During the month preceding the meeting, the floor is open for nomination of candidates. Candidates may also be nominated from the floor at the Annual Meeting.

There is a provision in the constitution for casting a vote by proxy and also a provision stating that only paid up members of the club for the current year may cast votes. The list of paid up members is the same as the official mailing list so if you got this newsletter you are eligible. Excepted are recipients of courtesy copies of the newsletter like the Hamilton Public Library etc.

If you are interested in running you should make your interest known to other members who can put your name up for nomination and obtain a seconder. Also, if you are interested in change, now is the time to start putting together a slate of candidates who are willing to run for office. There will be an opportunity in the June Newsletter to publish information on behalf of candidates who are running and the same opportunity will be available at the Annual Meeting

The Hamilton Amateur Radio Club is a Non-Profit Corporation under the laws of Ontario and as such we are bound to follow procedures and report annually to the Province.

All this being said, the health of your club depends on how well the directors are able to bring forth good ideas and keep things rolling. Lets give the election process some thought and put together a group of directors who will obtain results in 2006-2007.
