Our Agreement with Canadian Warplane Heritage Museum

Some time has passed since the inauguration of VA3CWM, a HAM station at the Canadian Warplane Heritage Museum. In response to a request made by recent President, Roger Pimm, VE3UFZ, two members of the Museum, Doug Last VE3NBL, and Frank Love VA3FWL provided the following note to outline the relationship of our Club with the station and the responsibilities of club members who visit the station. Your executive feel it is appropriate to publish this note for the benefit of HARC members.

"The policy regarding the access to the Radio Room at the Museum by members of the Hamilton Amateur Radio Club is outlined as follows:

The Museum, in recognition of the contribution the Hamilton Amateur Radio Club has made in establishing and operating a radio station at the Museum, has granted free entry of any bona fide member of the H.A.R.C., and one guest, to the Museum at any time.

Any member of the H.A.R.C. entering the Museum is required to sign in at the Main Reception Desk and obtain the key to the Radio Room. It is the member's responsibility to return the key and sign out when leaving the Museum.

It is also the responsibility of the member of the H.A.R.C., upon opening the door to the Radio

I hope this clarifies the policy regarding the use of the Radio Room at the C.W.H.M. by members of the H.A.R.C.

You may want to put this in the next club newsletter. I have cleared it with Frank and we both agree it should clear up any misunderstandings regarding the Radio Room at the Museum.

Education Report - Mardy VE3QEE In the Education department we have had two successful basic courses this year. Over the years a number of candidates have joined the club following one of the courses. Recent examples include Paul Selvey VE3XPS, Patrick Maille VE3PMA, Anita Thomas VA3ANI, John Hudak VE3CXB, to name a few who are here tonight. Classes are planned for September 2006 although a venue has not been finalized at this time. Six or seven potential candidates have made inquiries. Mike Hewitt VE3MHX is planning to join Mardy in presenting the basic course material and may be taking over some of the educational duties along the way.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u> - Fred VE3GCP Three years ago when Fred became treasurer our expenses were high

with mandidtory insurance taking the biggest bite of funds. Also we were still sending out too many newsletters. Over three years, expenses have been brought under control. Thanks to a new RAC group policy, under which our Club qualifies for coverage at a reasonable cost, our insurance expense continues to fall. Incidentally, insurance is required for our Club to do things like use the repeater site, rent Marritt Hall, and use the Field Day site. We have reduced the number of bulletins [newsletters] we send out so that it is members who are getting bulletins not a lot of others. Our club has been selling equipment. Some of this equipment was older club property being stored. A lot of equipment was donated by the families of dear club members who have recently passed away. Some equipment was given by members like who wanted the club to get rid of it. Fred and Mardy, occasionally Emsley, have been going to flea markets and selling this equipment with the proceeds coming to the club. We are now in a much healthier position financially than three years ago. Looking ahead, we like the policy of zero-based budgeting, keeping expenses in line with what is coming in, at the same time, we are financially healthy again and more able to support activities the club would like to do.

Membership Report - Emsley VE3JAI Last year we finished with 75 members and this year we have 70. These figures represent quite a decrease from when Emsley started some 14 years ago. We are not sure about the reasons for the decline but perhaps the new executive will find ways of attracting members to the club.

Repeater - John VE3DVV
There were a couple of outages on the repeater this year, one on the phone patch and one on the 440 machine. Both were looked after. We want to re-implement IRLP. For testing purposes we had a computer hooked up to a handheld for a while and it worked but not well enough to leave in service. At present we are looking for a suitable low power radio of 5 to 10 watts. The computer

part is set up and ready to use. The IRLP will be run from John's location. We are still planning to do maintenance mast and anchor work prior to installing the 4-bay antenna on the 2-meter repeater.

Jeff had family stuff for Sunday, also Mardy and Emsley wouldn't be out. Mike was having Roger Pimm VE3UFZ pick him up on Sunday and Dave Bruton said he would be there again.
