
In the Nick of Time

Minutes of the September 19, 2007 General Meeting

Our guest speaker for this meeting was Guenther Schweigl of i2S Technologies. Guenther's presentation was on the technology and techniques used in mapping RF radiation patterns. Guenther showed the club the sophisticated software used in creating 3D models of radiation patterns of single and multiple antennas. This software not

only showed the geometric pattern generated by the intermingling of RF radiation patterns, but also showed the relative intensity of the radiation by using a colour scale illustration which used red for intense radiation through to blue for faint radiation. This computer model is used to predict the effects of RF transmission from multiple antenna sites in built up areas like the intense field surrounding the top of the CN Tower. Using the modeling program Guenther demonstated how the combination of a typical high gain antenna along with high power could place some areas of the typical HAM household within the field of harmful exposure.

Guenther showed us a high gain compact log periodic UHF/VHF antenna manufactured by his company Degen Designs which is available at local Hamfests.

Business Meeting

The meeting opened with the official handing over of the gavel from Mardy VE3QEE to Lorraine VA3NZ. Casey VE3CVP presented Mardy with the Order of the Gavel. This is the third time that Mardy has received this award. Congratulations Mardy! The minutes of the May General Meeting were presented as published in the club newsletter. It was moved by Fred VE3GCP and seconded by Doug VE3NBL that the minutes be adopted as published.

Treasurers Report: Fred VE3GCP reported that the club spent around \$400 to upgrade the club repeater. There were some minor special costs associated with the club's 75th Anniversary. Other than that, the club is in good financial shape. Fred indicated that he will be assembling a formal "Year End" financial report for the Executive meeting. The doors open at 6:00 a.m. for setting up tables and chairs before vendors arrive at 7:00 a.m. The Pathfinders will operate the kitchen again as they have in previous years. The Pathfinders provide free coffee during the Flea Market and use the proceeds of food sales to sponsor camping costs for girls. The Flea Market is usually over by noon.
