

Membership Chair Report

Hello HARC Members ...

I wanted to discuss the reason for the rates on the memberships that we receive from the group. The recent rate increase is mostly related to the insurance we currently have with RAC. Luckily, RAC has an insurance policy for HAM radio clubs. The rates after 911 have sky-rocketed since that event for any type of group insurance. We have the lowest rate available and that is one great benefit RAC has to offer its members and clubs.

The HARC membership rate for a RAC primary member is 31\$ and 42\$ for non-RAC members.

There have been some questions about what RAC charges the club in terms of its RAC members and non-RAC members. This information is available on the RAC web page however, I will try and explain the rates RAC charges the club for insurance.

Annual Insurance Fee Calculation

Note 1: The insurance policy is based on the total number of people in the club, therefore all members of a club whether licensed or non-licensed, social, life, or family must be listed. Multiple memberships such as Club Family Memberships must be broken down and reported as the total number of people covered by each family membership and the number of them that are RAC members.

Note 2: As this is a program provided by Radio Amateurs of Canada for the benefit of its membership, the cost for non RAC members is significantly higher.

Note 3: In a few instances, some Clubs with activities outside of the normal scope of the policy may incur a surcharge from AON Insurance, in addition to the fee calculated below.

Note 4: For club liability purposes only, Affiliated Club Honorary, Life Members (as of Dec. 31, 2010), youth (under 18 years) and student (under 25 years) members are exempt from the \$11 surcharge for NON-RAC club members.

Liability Insurance Fee Calculation:

Annual Fee = A+[# of Club members * B] + [# of Non RAC members * C] where:

A = Annual RAC Insurance Program Registration fee = \$150.00/yr. B = Annual fee per club member = \$1.00/yr. C = Surcharge per NON RAC club member = \$11.00/yr.

Examples: Club A

84 members of which 64 are also members of RAC. Therefore, the # of NON RAC members = 84 - 64 = 20 Fee = \$150 + [84*\$1.00] + [20*\$11.00] = \$388.00

Club B

84 members of which 15 are also members of RAC. Therefore, # of NON RAC members = 84 - 15 = 69 Fee = \$150 + [84*\$1.00] + [69*\$11.00] = \$993.00

R.A.C. Bulletin **Enforcing the Radio-Communication Regulations**

summary by Mardy, VE3QEE

In a recent e-mail from RAC, members were informed that the government is changing the way certain Radiocommunication Regulations will be enforced.

When the changes come into effect, peace officers including Municipal, Provincial and RCMP police officers will be able to issue tickets for certain offenses under the Radio-communication Regulations. Information can be found on the web at:

Under this change, six offenses for which hams could be ticketed are: Operating non compliant equipment. \$250 Communicating with a station not in the amateur radio service. \$250 Transmitting music. \$100

Transmitting material from a broadcast undertaking. \$100

Transmitting in support of industrial, business or professional activities. \$250

Demanding or accepting remuneration for radio-communication. \$250

I have been told the police consider the "3C's" when investigating an alleged infraction. Has there been a complaint? Is the activity conspicuous? Is the activity commercial?

Up until now hams knew we were to abide by the regulations but no clear pathway was defined by which infractions would be enforced. Now, under the law, peace officers are empowered to issue tickets to enforce certain radio-communication regulations.

Thanks Mardy for the heads up. We have all heard those very few licensed and unlicensed operators abusing the airwaves and the privilege we have as HAM's. As H.A.R.C members our integrity and image in the community has been above reproach preserving the value and respect our club members work so very hard to maintain.
