systems, inverter systems, converter systems, depth sounders, anemometers and knot meters all are digital now and all produce noise. It used to be a simple problem of suppressing alternator noise - not any more. Fortunately, when I leave the harbour and get out into the lake the QRM falls away so my radio isn't totally useless (only in the harbour). VHF worked fine and I was able to use out club repeater while in Toronto. I have a 5/8 wavelength antenna mounted 65 feet above the water, so I have a clean shot at our repeater at Fennel and Gage.

QSL Cards Revisited

Not all amateurs exchange QSL cards to confirm a contact. But, for those that do it is necessary to have a card that records basic information about the contact, for example callsign, date, time, frequency, RST, mode, location and how to respond to a received card. Beyond that ordinary information each card becomes unique. You see, many amateurs strive to add a personal touch to their cards and by doing so reveal something about their humanity. Initally, the card is physical proof of a contact having been made. However, the richness and variety cards in a

collection is what makes them worth keeping and looking back over at a later time. To make my point, here are a couple of QSL cards recently received by Andrew Best VE3RIA which he was willing to share.

You just can't get any more down home than the combination of elements shown on the humorous card from Tennessee. Advice Regarding Damage by Lightening.

The following e-mail exchange was posted to one of the radio related reflectors that I monitor. While I hope none of you will ever incur damage by lightening the suggestions given here might have been helpful if you did.

Question:

Lightning hit the shack last evening. Although everything was on surge protectors, spikes came in through the phone line, blew the surge protector and took out my DSL modem. I further discovered that my computer seems to have lost its Ethernet card, and maybe the Firewire card. The transceiver turns on, but the computer does not see it. What tests can I do to determine whether the communication issue is with the radio, the computer, or both?

Answer:

Ouch, that is too bad.

If you haven't filed a claim on your house insurance, you need to do that now. They will take care of determining what has failed. At least, that is what I did on a hydro surge. This is why you pay for it. For you 5000, the easiest test is to try another computer. However, if the ethernet card is gone, it will have taken most other things on the bus. But, sadly it is a crap shoot. The transceiver should be written off by your insurance company as there is no way to be 100% that you can repair it back to factory specs. It just isn't practical at all.

I say all the above as an ex Manager of a Ham Radio Store. We would get one of these per week and everyone was handled by the insurance. We never tried to repair anything as there was no way to guarantee it. They also have their professionals who do this.We never had any trouble with any claims either.Again, sorry to hear that. It is a pain in the butt, but you should come out ok.

International Lighthouse Lightship Weekend 2014

We used the Club call VE3DC and activated the Burlington Main Light CA0015 for the ILLW event. Present on Saturday was Rick VE3BK, Mardy VE3QEE, Mike Krebs VA3WXS,Scott VE3QU & Georgette, Jack VE3WBT & Donna, Barry VE3ISX, Kevin VE3HNG, Dan VA3DJ & HIS Dad Joe Martinak,

Mardy tried out his rebuilt G5RV antenna. It was centre fed and supported by a large tree in the middle and 2 other trees at the ends. The vertical feed line section was pulled horizontal in the direction of the pavilion with a toroidal sleeve choke at the feed point. I have never seen a full size G5RV work as good as this one. We didn't even need the tuner we had borrowed from David VE3DWJ. The only band that we needed the tuner for was the 15m band. We made a lot of our contacts on 40 meters, some on 80 meters and some on 20 meters too. The antenna worked very well both days (Saturday August 16th and Sunday August 17th, 2014) Two radios were used: Scott's VE3QU Kenwood and Mardy's VE3QEE Flex radios. Good Time To Buy A Flex 3000 ?

I follow the Flex Radio Digest, an email reflector. It appears that this is a good time to purchase a used Flex 3000 on line. They are selling for around \$1100 US almost daily on the reflector. The reason the 3000 models are becoming so available now is because the Flex 6300 production has caught up with the backorders and people are taking delivery of their new model and deciding to sell their older model. In many cases these"older" models are only two or three years old. Not really that old by amateur radio standards!

Flex 3000s are still in production and will remain so according to Flex. The Flex 3000 requires a computer with a Firewire card and Windows 7 or 8 operating system. The Flex 3000 is a full power100 watt radio. It ships with a built in antenna tuner.
