The Great Ontario QSO DX Saga of April, 2015

The Great Ontario QSO DX Saga began as a twinkle in the eye of one of our more adventurous members, Paul Fleck VE3HTF. The idea was to head North till the lakes and streams were still frozen, set up camp, start



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the generators and blast the airwaves. This adventure was intended to be a fun exercise, not a knock em down, carry them out of the building contest event. The idea was to have some fun, fellowship and at the same time experiment with radio equipment with a Field Day approach to technical issues. Well, we were successful on all fronts.

The location we ended up going to was on the shore of Lake Manitou (not the Lake Manitou on Manitouin





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Island). This lake is quite a distance North of Sturgeon Falls. Check it out on Google Earth or Maps; Lat 46 52' 38.5"N, Long 80 16' 38.11"W. The luxury accommodation was a licensed trap line cabin on Crown Land, complete with Out House and abattoir shack. The Out House had a glass storm door facing the Lake. An interesting view of the frozen lake and the occasional martins and otters playing in the fore shore melt. For a city guy it was quite a shock to see that there are still trappers in Ontario that rely on their annual catch to augment their daily bread.

We used two vehicles; Paul's pickup and Ahmet's SUV. The trip



up was uneventful... a few VHF simplex contacts were made around Huntsville with local hams. We were invited to use local repeaters but were unprepared to change our rigs to frequencies and tones while underway. This year we will remedy that issue and have manuals available and some repeaters preprogrammed. We used simplex to keep the two vehicles in contact. A few jokes were passed back and forth to break the monotony. The radios were really handy to organized comfort/fuel breaks.

The roads at the end of the journey were basically gravel, with frequent washouts. It wasn't difficult to understand why there are so many off road 4 wheelers that far North. Trucks outnumbered cars at least 10 to one. The lakes and streams were certainly still frozen. Thankfully we had lots of bottled fresh water.

We actually made many SSB contacts, thanks to Jim VE3JS/VE3EEZ. We ran a variety of antennas. Jim ran a full size G5RV. Paul VE3HTF ran a buddy pole rig that was planted on the back of his pickup. This was later moved further away from the cabin and Jim's G5RV because the two antennas were talking to each... not a desirable effect. Ahmet VE3TUR, who had made the arrangements for the cabin through a close friend of his, Pierre, ran 10 meters SSB.

Meals were a treat. We all pitched in with our own personal menu items. Ahmet took the Chef's Trophy with his



steaks cooked outdoors over a real wood fire. There is nothing like fresh air to build an appetite. At night we were quite comfortable with the wood stove stoked up.

The trip home was uneventful, as expected. We were really a bunch of tired puppies by the time we found our own vehicles, but not too tired to commit to a return trip this year, 2016. Listen for us during this year's Ontario QSO Party. We will be signing VE3RCB TIM, (for the Timiskaming District).

Recipe for Chocolate Chip Cookies

What You Need:

- I cup butter, softened
- I cup packed brown sugar I/2 cup granulated sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2 tsp. vanilla
- 2-1/4 cups flour
- I tsp. baking soda
- I pkg. (300 g) Baker's Semi-Sweet Chocolate Chips

* Heat oven to 375∞F.

* Beat butter, sugars, eggs and vanilla in large bowl until light and fluffy. Stir in flour and baking soda until well blended. Add chocolate chips; mix well.

* Drop tablespoonfuls of dough, 2 inches apart, onto baking sheets.

* Bake 10 to 12 min. or until lightly browned. Cool on baking sheet 3 min. Remove to wire racks; cool completely.

At the same meeting there will also be time to hear from members who have a Show-And-Tell item to present to members. 
So, if you want to know what happened to channel 1, listen to the HARC Friday night net, starting at 19:30 local time, on the VE3NCF repeaters.
